

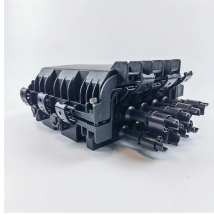

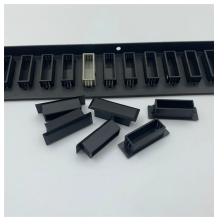

This is exactly why most professional installers have moved away from field-termination and toward splicing. The causes are usually lack of training, lack of practice and lack of understanding of what is a “good” and/or “acceptable” fiber optic connector. The end of the pigtail is stripped and fusion spliced to a single fiber of a multi-fiber trunk. Splicing of pigtails to each fiber in the trunk "breaks out" the multi-fiber cable into its component fibers for ...



After the coating is removed, clean the fiber with isopropyl alcohol to assure the fiber is clean, as contaminants on the fiber wall can cause the fiber to mis-align itself in the alignment fixture.

Connector and splice loss is caused by a number of factors. Loss is minimized when the two fiber cores are identical and perfectly aligned, the connectors or splices are properly finished and no dirt is present.



To minimize the chance of injury from the cut armor, cover the exposed edge with a wrap of electrical tape. To minimize the chance of injury from sharp-bladed tools, always cut away from yourself and ...
